



# The Baptism of the Lord

Is 42:1-4, 6-7 | Acts 10:34-38 | Lk 3:15-16, 21-22

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE In many renditions of the Baptism of Jesus, artists connect the scene at the Jordan River with Jesus' death. A withered tree, for example, reminds us of the cross, or a mountain points to Mount Calvary. These connections show a real relationship between Jesus' baptism and his passion: his baptism marks the acceptance and beginning of his mission, which would ultimately lead to his crucifixion. For us, too, baptism is a decisive moment which destines us for - you guessed it death! Not physical death (which will happen regardless), but a death to everything that is not of God. By making us part of God's family as his adopted children, our baptism summons us to "die" to our old life of sin and take on new life in Christ. This means turning away each day from sin so we can become increasingly fit to spend eternity with God. Like Jesus who rose both from the baptismal waters and from the tomb, we are meant, by our daily efforts to be faithful - to "rise" with

him in the new life he won for us.

#### PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

After Jesus is baptized, two important events occur immediately: the Holy Spirit descends upon him while God the Father proclaims his delight in his Son: "You are my beloved Son; with you I am well pleased." Here we see the profound meaning of our own baptism and its effects. In addition to cleansing us from the stain of original sin, baptism: 1) gives us the gift of the Holy Spirit; and 2) welcomes us into God's family as his adopted children. Armed with the Holy Spirit and the assurance of God's fatherly care, we are equipped to engage in the daily struggle of dying-and-rising in Christ. We can always call on the Holy Spirit for strength when we face temptations or difficult decisions. Likewise, when we are discouraged or we confront our own weaknesses, we can look to the Father for help. Recall the words which the Father spoke to Jesus, and which he says to us in our baptism (and he doesn't take them back!): You are my beloved son. You are my beloved daughter. With you I am well pleased.


#### CELEBRATE

Find the date (or approximate date) of your baptism and the baptismal dates of your immediate family members. Make a list of the dates and spend time thanking God for his fatherly care for you. Then, when someone's baptismal anniversary comes around, make sure to celebrate!



In the reading from Isaiah, the Lord describes his servant with whom he has pleased. The servant will go through pain, will be bruised but will not break. He instead will be a light to the nations.

Like the servant described in Isaiah, we will go through pain and suffering at times. But if we can continue through the pain, God can use us as a light to others.



At Assumption, we preach in message series. Over several weeks, we will examine a topic in depth. We select a topic based on the weekend's scripture readings.

God speaks to us at every moment, especially in a community setting, when His people come together on Sundays and listen to the Word of God as we celebrate, pray, praise,

# **Small Groups**

**Small Groups** are where our large church gets small. Groups are 6-10 people who meet usually once a week for 90 minutes to discuss faith, go deeper in the weekly message, and support one another in their relationship with Christ. This is the place to care for others and be cared for; Assumption small groups are open to accept more people anytime


### THE JUBILEE PRAYER

# The Baptism of the Lord

#### Sunday, Jan 12, 2025

#### Make no small plans

Let's focus on what it means to be the *beloved* of God. God would do anything for you: The nearest crucifix underscores what God means by "anything." When such immense love comes into your life, you want to respond in a big way, too. Baptism readies us for the task. Just what happens in Baptism? Saint John Chrysostom says, God sends "the grace of the Spirit," and then "brings us forth with much brightness, renewed, and made afresh, to rival the beams of the sun." Take a moment to consider what you will do with the gift of your radiant new life.

FEAST OF THE BAPTISM OF THE LORD Isaiah 42:1-4, 6-7; Acts 10:34-38; Luke 3:15-16, 21-22 (21). "You are my beloved Son; with you I am well pleased."

## Monday, Jan 13, 2025

#### Mystery solved

This month the liturgy draws extensively from the Letter to the Hebrews, which biblical commentators have called the "most elegant and sophisticated, and perhaps the most enigmatic, text of first-century Christianity." In early centuries it was attributed to Saint Paul, but the language and theology are very unlike Paul's letters. After discussing the possibilities, Origen (185-254), the first great biblical scholar, remarked: "But who wrote the epistle, in truth, God knows." That is true of all the mysteries of our faith. But as Hebrews reminds us, "In times past, God spoke in partial and various ways through the prophets," and now he speaks to us through his Son, "through whom he created the universe." Listen to Jesus, and the mysteries of the universe will be revealed.

Hebrews 1:1-6; Mark 1:14-20 (305). "The Kingdom of God is at hand. Repent, and believe in the Gospel."

### Tuesday, Jan 14, 2025

#### How to be amazing

The authority of Jesus comes from the fact that his words and actions are of a piece. People hear the ring of truth in what Jesus says. Indeed, Pope Francis says, "Jesus is the one who brings God to us and us to God." And for these reasons he attracts attention, and people are amazed. If you want to command authority, don't throw your weight around. Rather, speak truthfully, live with integrity, and bring God to others. People will be amazed.

Hebrews 2:5-12; Mark 1:21-28 (306). "All were amazed and asked one another, 'What is this? A new teaching with authority."

# Wednesday, Jan 15, 2025

## What the cross puts into perspective

The image of the crucified Christ signifies not what he can do for us, but what he actually *did* for us. His willingness to enter into our suffering reveals that God's love is always present. Reflect on the immense suffering Christ bore across time and across the world. As Saint Rose of Lima observed, "No one would complain about his cross or about troubles that may happen to him, if he would come to know the scales on which they are weighed." Pray for relief for your own suffering and, in turn, extend mercy to others so that they may experience Christ's compassion through you.

Hebrews 2:14-18; Mark 1:29-39 (307). "He is able to help those who are being tested."

#### Thursday, Jan 16, 2025

#### Daily affirmations

Pope John XXII advised Christians: "Consult not your fears but your hopes and your dreams." In other words, instead of dwelling on how bad things are or could become—whether it is worries about money, family, health issues, your job, or the state of the world—there is something you can depend on: Today is a new day filled with the promise of God's salvation. Take a moment each day to ponder your dreams and embrace the hope Christ brings.

Hebrews 3:7-14; Mark 1:40-45 (308). "Encourage yourselves daily while it is still 'today.'"

#### Friday, Jan 17, 2025

### Faith lives through community

"Christianity means community through Jesus Christ and in Jesus Christ," said theologian Dietrich Bonhoeffer. "No Christian community is more or less than this." Indeed, it is impossible to be Christian alone. Ours is a relational faith. Even when just one baby is being baptized or one class of second-graders receives the Eucharist for the first time, the words, gestures, and intentions of the sacrament benefit the entire church. Jesus did not write a book; he formed a community. Advance that community by actively participating in your parish and opening the door to others.

Hebrews 4:1-5, 11; Mark 2:1-12 (309). "They came bringing to him a paralytic carried by four men."

#### Saturday, Jan 18, 2025

#### Step out of the shadows

We now understand that the source of much of our negative behavior lies buried in past events and hidden impulses. The downside of this awareness, however, has been a greater difficulty taking personal responsibility for our actions. Yet, the act of confessing our sins—acknowledging when we've turned from God—is life-giving and draws us out of the shadows of our transgressions. As Saint Augustine said, "You do the truth and come to the light." Keep that light on with a regular examination of conscience.

Hebrews 4:12-16; Mark 2:13-17 (310). "I did not come to call the righteous but sinners."
