Third Sunday in Ordinary Time

Neh 8:2-4a, 5-6, 8-10 | 1 Cor 12:12-30 | Lk 1:1-4; 4:14-21

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE Late 19th-century English author G.K. Chesterton famously wrote, "Catholic doctrine and discipline may be walls, but they are the walls of a playground." We can think of God's commandments serving as rules governing primary school recess: by providing us with a structure in which we can explore, play, stumble, and get up again, they allow us to discover who God created us to be without wandering far from his love. The mosaic law that served the Jews in today's first reading had given them the necessary parameters to live and grow within the covenantal relationship they had with God. Their unfaithfulness had led them astray, but upon their return from exile in Babylon they wept when hearing God's word for the first time in generations. They knew the power of God's commandments to keep them safe and secure in his love, and recognized all they had lost by wandering. Their sorrow was turned to joy in the knowledge that God rejoiced in their return to him.

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

Just as Ezra "opened the scroll so that all the people might see it" in today's first reading, Jesus also "unrolled the scroll" and then rolled it back up so that all might see him. Ezra held the law in his hands, Jesus is the fulfillment of the law in himself. Jesus' words in today's Gospel, "Today this Scripture passage is fulfilled in your hearing," were an infusion of new life breathed into a new creation by God who is outside of time. All things, all mistakes, all failures brought about in our human pride and disobedience were being refashioned into new brick and mortar to build God's kingdom in and through Christ. Jesus, with his commandment to love one another as he loves us, gives us structure and a true freedom to discover who God created us to be, while helping us not wander far from this playground the Lord has given us. Knowing what holds us together, and relying on it to guide us, enables us to help build the kingdom even more for the glory of God and the good of others.

LEARN

Research a Catholic teaching you do not fully understand for example, why Catholics attend Mass on Sundays. Ask God for the light to see how this teaching is life-giving instead of lifelimiting. If you have the opportunity, share what you've learned with someone.

One of the ways we grow our faith in unexpected crises is by growing our faith in ordinary times first: daily quiet time, listening to him in Scripture and speaking to him in prayer, Weekly worship of God at Mass. It's like a deposit in your bank account, it's a deposit in the relationship account you have with God. We increase our understanding of God and who he is. Through such an investment, the joy of the Lord really can become our strength. That's going to equip us for whatever might be ahead.

God speaks to us at every moment, especially in a community setting,

when His people come together on Sundays and listen to the Word of God as we celebrate, pray, praise, and thank God. Then the discussion continues in the Small Groups and goes deeper. Our message series usually runs from September to July. Our mission continues to Love God, Serve Others, and Grow Disciples.

Small Groups

Small Groups are where our large church gets small. Groups are 6-10 people who meet usually once a week for 90 minutes to discuss faith, go deeper in the weekly message, and support one another in their relationship with Christ. This is the place to care for others and be cared for; Assumption small groups are open to accept more people anytime

Hidden lives cast a shadow

Humans are afflicted with the desire to make lists, categorize, arrange according to significance, and especially to assign importance among people. But we never see the whole picture, so how can we know who is more important, or which ability or action has the greatest potential for good?

In *Middlemarch* George Eliot reminds us: "For the growing good of the world is partly dependent upon un-historic acts, and that things are not so ill with you and me as they might have been is half owing to the number who lived faithfully a hidden life and rest in unvisited tombs." Remember, we are all part of the Body of Christ; we are all necessary and important.

Remember for humanity's sake

At the Wannsee Conference in January 1942, senior Nazi officials met to coordinate the implementation of the "Final Solution to the Jewish Question." No longer interested in driving Jews out of Germany, the Nazis embarked on a more efficient campaign: systematic extermination of those they deemed "undesirable" and "enemies of the state." In addition to the estimated 6 million Jews murdered, millions of others—political dissidents, Poles, Romani people, individuals with disabilities, gays, Jehovah's Witnesses, Catholics, and people of African descent—were also targeted. For any devoid of humanity, this plan could be seen as a success. For the rest of us, it stands as one of the darkest moments in human history, when evil reigned. On International Holocaust Remembrance Day, remember the horror of the final solution, for, as Pope Francis says, "Remembering is a condition for a better future of peace and fraternity."

Faith is not simply unquestioned belief; rather, it often inspires us to ask questions. As Saint Anselm, an 11th-century theologian and doctor of the church, said, "Faith seeks understanding." This desire to both believe and understand is a constant throughout our spiritual journey. We read, pray, and engage in discussions, hoping the mysteries of our faith, the universe, and our own lives will be revealed. When it comes to differing opinions, Saint Thomas Aquinas reminds us, "We must love them both, those whose opinions we share and those whose opinions we reject, for both have labored in the search for truth, and both have helped us find it." So, keep asking your questions; it is an essential part of a vibrant and healthy faith life.

Catholic Schools Week is the perfect time to reflect on what we can learn from our Catholic schoolchildren. One young student wrote in a religion class report, "If you do good things, you will have good experiences. If you do bad things, you will have bad experiences." This simple yet profound understanding of virtuous living echoes Jesus' teaching in the gospel: "The measure you give will be the measure you get." If we want the young people in our lives to lead lives of love and good works, we do well to model those actions ourselves.

Share and share alike

Christians commonly suffered the confiscation of their property during the persecutions of the early church, and church property has been confiscated by hostile governments ever since. Perhaps that is why the Catholic Church defends the right to private property. Yet the church also says that this right is not absolute; it is limited by the concept of the "social mortgage," our mutual obligations to one another and to a just distribution of wealth. You can read about church teaching on property and other social issues in the first "social encyclical," *Rerum novarum* ("On the Condition of Labor"), written by Pope Leo XIII and issued in 1891 (www.vatican.va).

Hebrews 10:32-39; Mark 4:26-34 (<u>321</u>). "You . . . joyfully accepted the confiscation of your property, knowing that you had a better and lasting possession."

Saturday, Feb 01, 2025 A holy roll call

In 1941 author James Agee and photographer Walker Evans published *Let Us Now Praise Famous Men*, a book chronicling the lives of Alabama sharecropper families in the 1930s. The title came from the first verse of chapter 44 in the Book of Sirach: "Let us now sing the praises of famous men, our ancestors in their generations"—ironic, because the book was about people who were distinctly un-famous. The Sirach passage introduces a recognizable form of biblical literature, the listing of people who were models of faith and virtue. Parents, teachers, coaches, bosses, maybe even a great-grandmother whose stern photo on the wall sees you out the door each day—each of us has a holy roll call of spiritual ancestors whose lives have guided us.
